### General Education Courses

**40050 COM 215-71 Family Communication** 3 SH  
W 5:00 – 7:30 p.m. L. Bianchi WF 208

This course examines communication as it functions in family systems. Students will focus on identifying patterns of communication, development of communication rules, information processing and research issues related to the field. **Prerequisite:** COM 160, COM 161, or COM 162. *General Education:* Humanities/Communication.

**41213 HPX 290-71 Body Therapies & Meditation** 1 SH

R 5:00 – 9:00 p.m. (3/29 – 4/19) J. Dreyer WF 204

This introductory course explores various forms of bodywork and focused mindfulness. The class will cover the following topics: massage iridology, reflexology, acupressure, body movement (Tai Chi), meditation, visualization and guided imagery. An experiential component is included.

**40828 HPX 292-71 Naturopathy, Homeopathy, Herbs & Nutrition** 1 SH

W 5:00 – 9:00 p.m. (3/28 – 4/18) J. Dreyer WF 204

This course will examine the areas of naturopathy, homeopathy, herbs and nutritional self-care.

**41195 MAT 115-71 Introduction to Biostatistics** 3 SH

M 6:30 – 9:00 p.m. TBA WF 205

Primary focus is on statistical comprehension of the research aspects of current nursing, medical and other health-related literature through an understanding of statistics utilizing the computer. Not open to students who have passed MAT 120. **Prerequisite:** “C” or higher in MAT 100 or appropriate test score. *General Education:* Mathematics.

**40414 PSY 203-72 Clinical Psychology** 3 SH  
T 6:00 – 8:30 p.m. J. Chen WF 208

A course which focuses on theories, diagnostic techniques and treatment modalities in the field of clinical psychology. Consideration will also be given to social, legal and philosophical issues in the assessment and treatment of mental illness as well as in problems of daily living. **Prerequisite:** PSY 100. *General Education:* Psychology.

**41217 WRT 210W-71 Managerial Writing** 3 SH

M 6:30 – 9:00 p.m. A. Witkavitch WF 202

This course is geared toward the needs of business majors. Students will learn how to write effective letters, memos, reports, handouts, e-mails and PowerPoint presentations. They will also learn the basics of document design and apply these principles to their writing assignments. Special emphasis will be placed on ethical communication, audience considerations, word choice and tone. *General Education:* Humanities/Communication.

### Business Courses

**40591 MGT 320-71 Operations Management** 3 SH

R 5:25 – 7:55 p.m. M. Chuang WF 202

Operations management is concerned with the management of the production function of organizations in which services and goods are produced. This management process is separated into the general areas of scheduling, quality, materials and methods. The course presents concepts and tools necessary for effective and efficient management of these areas, their strong interactions and their effects on employees. **Prerequisite:** FIN 230 and junior standing.

**40598 MGT 376-71 Managing People** 3 SH  
R 8:00 – 10:30 p.m. D. Knibbe WF 202

This course views managing as a set of processes focusing on the manager, those managed, and the work they do. The roles, skills, competencies, ethics and knowledge used by managers are emphasized. **Prerequisite:** MGT 250 and GPA 2.3 or higher.

**40605 MGT 410-71 Current Issues in Management** 3 SH

T 5:45 – 8:15 p.m. L. Forbes WF 202

This senior level seminar is an integrative examination of topics of current interest to managers. The course presentation will utilize case studies, current literature, student research papers, student presentations and/or outside speakers to achieve its purpose. **Prerequisite:** senior standing and GPA 2.3 or higher.

### Nursing Courses: Open To RN Students Only

**NUR 221 Physical Assessment Across the Life Span** 3 SH

Introduces concepts and techniques of physical assessment in the context of the nursing process. Laboratory experiences provide students with the opportunities to develop examination skills in preparation for clinical courses (2.5 hrs. lecture; 1.5 hrs. laboratory).

**NUR 336 The Human Health Experience** 3 SH

Exploration of the human experience from a holistic perspective. Attention is given to cultural, behavioral, biological, cognitive, spiritual, social and developmental factors that contribute to one's view of health. Emphasis is placed on therapeutic nursing interventions that improve outcomes for patients. Teaching-learning interventions, health counseling and alternative/complementary therapies are selected as examples of holistic nursing approaches. Open only to RN to BS students. **Prerequisite:** Current RN license, Admission to the RN to BS program; BIO 105, 106, 215, MAT 100.

**40864 NUR 361-71 Research Process in Nursing** 2 SH

M 4:00 – 5:50 p.m. B. Piscopo WF 204

Exploration of the principles and concepts underlying the research process as it is used in conducting empirical nursing research studies. Analysis and critique of extant nursing research, with an emphasis on evaluation of research for application in practice. **Prerequisite:** admission to the nursing major, or admission to the RN to BS program, MAT 115 or 120.

**40866 NUR 374-02 Leadership & Management in Contemporary Nursing Practice** 2 SH

T 4:00 – 5:50 p.m. J. Palladino WF 210

Application of the principles of leadership and management within the context of professional nursing practice. Roles of the professional nurse as assertive leader, manager of resources and patient care, and change agent are explored. **Prerequisite:** NUR 255. Co-requisite: NUR 335.

Capstone course in the practice of professional nursing, addressing issues related to entry into professional practice and the contextual issues surrounding health care delivery. Clinical experiences allow students to practice the full role of the professional nurse under the guidance of a clinical preceptor and faculty mentor. (1 hr. lecture, 1 hr. seminar, 135 hrs. clinical laboratory) **Pre- and co-requisites:** all required Registered Nursing program courses.
