11294 ENG 107-71 Introduction to Drama 3 SH
 T 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 Staff WF 204
 Study of representative plays from various cultures and eras. Students will develop a basic understanding of tragedy and comedy and the human conflicts created and resolved through each. Not for major credit. *General Education:* Humanities/Literature.

11283 HIS 246-71 Judaism 3 SH
 M 5 – 7:30 p.m.
 B. Needle WF 202
 A survey of the history of the Jewish people and their religion from the earliest times to the present. *General Education:* Humanities/Western History.

10624 HPX 293-71 Cross-Cultural Health and Healing 1 SH
 W 5 – 7:30 p.m.
 (8/30 – 10/22)
 J. Dreyer WF 210
 This course is an overview of methods used by many cultures to ensure balance in one's life in order to promote health and healing. The following topics will be included: Native American (e.g. Navajo) health and healing, ayurvedic practices, traditional Chinese health and healing, and a brief look at the use of plants for healing.

10335 MAT 118-74 Elementary Applied Math 3 SH
 M 7:35 – 10:05 p.m.
 Staff WF 208
 Fundamental mathematical tools useful in the study of business and the social sciences, including matrices and polynomial calculus. Not open to students who have completed MAT 181 or 135. **Prerequisite:** "C" or higher in MAT 100 or appropriate test score. *General Education:* CS/Mathematics.

10492 PS 104-71 World Governments, Economies and Cultures 3 SH
 W 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 P. Wagner WF 204
 Political, historical, economic and socio-cultural perspectives are used to examine the problems and prospects of the contemporary world. Course topics will be selected in terms of current global issues and developments. *General Education:* Social Sciences.

10782 PSY 245-71 Psychology of Creativity 3 SH
 W 5 – 7:30 p.m.
 Staff WF 202
 A survey of current knowledge about the creative person, the creative process and creative product. Students will be urged to conduct an empirical study during the semester. **Prerequisite:** PSY 100. *General Education:* Behavioral Science.

10249 SPA 198-71 Spanish for Professionals: Justice and Law 3 SH
 T 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 L. Bonilla WF 208
 This course focuses on communicative activities targeting the development of Spanish vocabulary, grammar and cultural aspects that Justice and Law Enforcement professionals need to reach out more efficiently to the ethnically diverse communities they serve and protect. *General Education:* Humanities/ World Languages and Literature.

11295 WRT 271W-72 Human Interest Writing (WI) 3 SH
 W 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 Staff WF 208
 A workshop on the basics of writing about people, including techniques for bringing observation, setting and emotion into the story. **Prerequisite:** WRT 101 or appropriate placement.

■ **Business Courses**

11047 FIN 230-72 Business Statistics 3 SH
 R 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 H. Namiot WF 205
 This course is an applications-oriented study of basic statistical concepts and techniques. Focus is on the use of descriptive and inferential statistics as an aid to managerial decision-making and on computer-based analysis of data. Topics include charts and graphs, distributions, measures of central tendency and dispersion, probability, sampling, estimation, hypothesis tests, correlation, regression and time series. **Prerequisite:** MAT 118 or 181 or 133 or 135 or MIS 260.

11074 MGT 320-71 Operations Management 3SH
 R 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 C. Chuang WF 202
 This course is concerned with the management of the production function of organizations in which services and goods are produced. This management process is separated into the general areas of scheduling, quality, materials and methods. The course presents concepts and tools necessary for effective and efficient management of these areas, their strong interactions and their effects on employees. **Prerequisite:** FIN 230 and junior standing.

11082 MGT 376-71 Managing People 3 SH
 T 8 – 10:30 p.m.
 Staff WF 202
 This course views managing as a set of processes focusing on the manager, those managed, and the work they do. The roles, skills, competencies, ethics and knowledge used by managers are emphasized. **Prerequisite:** MGT 250, GPA > 2.3.

11090 MGT 410-71 Current Issues in MGT 3 SH
 T 5:25 – 7:55 p.m.
 Staff WF 202
 This senior level seminar is an integrative examination of topics of current interest to managers. The course presentation will utilize case studies, current literature, student research papers, student presentations and/or outside speakers to achieve its purpose. **Prerequisite:** senior standing, GPA > 2.3.

 Exploration of the role of the professional nurse and transition of the registered nurse graduate's transition to that role. Foundational concepts related to nursing practice, wellness, and illness are explored within a framework of role transformation. **Prerequisite:** Open only to R.N. students.

Section 72 CRN 10649
 R 6 – 8:50 p.m.
 B. Piscopo WF 210
 Consideration of the community as a unit of health care. Focuses on the care of population aggregates and at-risk groups. **Prerequisite:** NUR 201, 205, & BIO 215. **Co-requisite:** NUR 225, 235 & 300. HPX 205. Open only to R.N. students.

10669 NUR 330-71 Nursing in the Community 4 SH
 T 8 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.
 E. Abate Clinical/Hospital
 T 3 – 4:50 p.m.
 E. Abate WF 210
 Focus on the concept of the community as a unit of health care, with application of the nursing process in providing care in the home and other community settings. **Prerequisite:** NUR 255, 300, 361. **Co-requisite:** NUR 325. (2 hrs lecture; 6 hrs clinical lab). Open only to R.N. students.

10671 NUR 332-71 Pharmacotherapeutics Across the Lifespan 3 SH
 T 5 – 7:50 p.m.
 L. Dalessio WF 210
 An in-depth analysis of common pharmacotherapeutics and diagnostics used currently in patient care. **Prerequisite:** admission into the nursing major, open only to R.N. students.
