As a Nursing major, you will study techniques and procedures for promoting health, and caring for disabled, sick, or otherwise unwell persons. Nursing roles range from direct patient care to case management, establishing nursing practice standards, developing quality assurance procedures, and directing complex nursing care systems. With the development of essential technical, critical thinking and advanced problem-solving skills, you have access to most health care-related industries and/or a myriad of clinical areas and career paths. Among these are pediatrics, family health, gerontology, oncology, neurology, epidemiology, addiction, health informatics, and more. Wide-ranging venues can include private/public health agencies, insurance and drug companies, nursing homes, hospice, and the military.

According to the <u>Bureau of Labor Statistics</u>, employment of registered nurses is projected to grow 6% from 2021 to 2031, about average for all occupations. Demand for expanding and/or changing health care services will continue due to many changing demographic, market, legislative, technical and regulatory forces.
