Western Connecticut State University Educational Events

- The Educational Unit Participates in the annual "One Book One Community" program to encourage everyone in Danbury to read the same book:
 - Farewell My Subaru: Author Doug Fine's eco-adventures of "going green." In October, OBOC hosted a series of events, including a community bike ride, a farm-to-table dinner and panel discussion on environmental issues. Fine visited the campus on Oct. 25, 2011. <u>Farewell My Subaru</u>
 - The Things They Carried, a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize and the National Book Critics Circle Award, is one soldier's personal account of life during the Vietnam War. Additional "One Book" events in October 2010 included a luncheon of Vietnamese foods at the dining hall in the WCSU Midtown campus Student Center; viewings of several movies related to Vietnam and the war, with facilitated discussions; book discussions at venues around Danbury; a panel discussion featuring veterans from several wars talking about the issues they faced when they returned home; an essay contest; and a monthlong effort to collect and deliver care packages to soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan.
- His Holiness the Dalai Lama came to Western for two public talks on Thursday, Oct. 18, 2012 ("The Art of Compassion"), and Friday, Oct. 19, 2012 ("Advice for Daily Life"). His visit was in cooperation with Do Ngak Kunphen Ling (DNKL) (Tibetan Buddhist Center for Universal Peace) in Redding. DNKL, under the guidance of spiritual director Gyumed Khensur Rinpoche Lobsang Jampa and the spiritual tradition of His Holiness the Dalai Lama, promotes universal peace through Tibetan Buddhist teachings to create enlightened individuals who work to end the suffering of others. - Banned Books Week: Sam Tanenhaus, the editor of The New York Times Book Review, will highlight Banned Books Week with a talk at Western Connecticut State University at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 28, in Ives Concert Hall in White Hall on WestConn's Midtown campus, 181 White St. in Danbury. Tanenhaus said his talk, Books and Free Speech: How Far is Too Far? will examine "tension today between the ever-present threat of censorship and the growing literature of abuse, particularly in the area of political writing (much of it influenced by the Web and cable), which seems to have claimed center stage in the past several years."
