*Minimum GPA of 3.5 in the major is required to qualify for the honors track. Students who participate in the honors sequence must identify a faculty member to oversee the course work. It is recommended that students seeking a career in applied, clinical or counseling psychology, or graduate school in those areas, take PSY 306 (new course in Spring 2015), the Internship in Psychology. Students seeking an acasemic or research career and planning on applying to graduate school should complete research with a faculty member via PSY 299 (student developed study), PSY 450, PSY 460, or the Honors track (PSY 475 and 476). Initial math and writing placements will determine the number of free electives. MAT100 & WRT101 are free electives but may be required as a pre-requisite for a general education math and writing intensive courses.

Psychology With Distinction Option (for psychology majors only)

The psychology department offers a Psychology with Distinction Option to highly motivated psychology majors interested in pursuing a one-year, two-course honors reading and research project in addition to all other requirements for a psychology major. This option provides an opportunity to supplement the Psychology Degree by conducting a substantial, independent empirical project under the supervision of a Psychology faculty member. Completion of this Option requires prior approval from a psychology faculty member, and entails a two-semester sequence of courses: an Honors Guided Reading (PSY 475) and an Honors Thesis (PSY 476).

Requirements for a Minor in Psychology:

Take any 18 credits in Psychology, including PSY 100, at least nine of which must be taken at WCSU, with a minimum GPA of 2.0.

Academic Requirements for Certification of Substance Abuse Counselors (CADC)

We offer four courses in substance abuse counseling (PSY 392, 393, 394 and 395) which together meet the academic requirements for Certification of Substance Abuse Counselors as defined by the Connecticut Certification Board (CRB). Other requirements for certification are 6,000 hours of paid substance abuse counseling experience and a passing score on a written test.
