#### From the DEMHS State School Safety Program Desk:

Dear School Safety Partners,

I'd like to thank you for signing up to get this important newsletter. As always, please feel free to contact me with any school plan questions.

I've shared a recent experience below involving a school drill and how it demonstrated areas needing improvement.

#### **Communications for Drills and Real Events:**

Every real event, drill or exercise I have been involved in, relied on good communications. In almost every after-action report, a break down or lack of communications was listed as an improvement item.

I received a call the other day from an individual who was looking for information on school communications for drills, and real events. Their school had just experienced a crisis drill in which there was little to no communication or alert to the drill. The school has several buildings on a large campus.

Some people received a garbled message, some received no message at all, and others received the full message. The notification platform being used has been their notification system for a couple years and utilizes a single mode of notification (phone call with a scripted message). Was this drill a failure? NO. The purpose of every drill is to test, but you must find a solution to improve the response.

Every school needs a reliable alerting system using multiple modes of notification. There are several platforms available with multiple options and price ranges. Please consider joining your regional school safety workgroup and discuss what platforms are in use and their effectiveness.

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## PreventionResourceFinder.gov Launches to Provide Easier Access to Resources to Prevent Targeted Violence and Terrorism

## PreventionResourceFinder.gov Launches to Provide Easier Access to Resources to Prevent Targeted Violence and Terrorism

WASHINGTON – Today, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and its federal partners launched PreventionResourceFinder.gov, a new website that will help prevent targeted violence and terrorism by giving the public easier access to available grants, research, training opportunities, and other resources across 17 federal agencies. PreventionResourceFinder.gov builds upon the Biden-Harris Administration's National Strategy for Countering Domestic Terrorism, released in June 2021, and last year's United We Stand Summit. Nearly 100 federal resources are featured on PreventionResourceFinder.gov at initial launch. The site will be continuously updated with new and refined content to support communities nationwide. "Targeted violence and terrorism are grave threats to our homeland security and it will take all of us, working together, to keep our communities safe," said Secretary of Homeland Security **Alejandro N. Mayorkas**. "The website we are launching today equips our partners throughout the country with helpful resources to better prevent, prepare for, and respond to acts of violence. From first responders to non-profit organizations, a whole-of-society approach is needed to keep our communities safe and secure. We will continue to provide additional resources, including grant funds and critical information and intelligence, to strengthen community efforts to prevent terrorism and targeted violence." PreventionResourceFinder.gov is organized into five searchable categories:

- Community Support Resources
- Information-Sharing Platforms
- Grant Funding Opportunities
- Evidence-Based Research
- Training Opportunities

Each category is further organized by the audience it is intended to reach including community partners, faith-based organizations, educators, behavioral health providers, and others. DHS recently released Notices of Funding Opportunity for the Fiscal Year 2023 <a href="Preparedness Grants">Preparedness Grants</a>, including the Nonprofit Security Grant Program, and for the <a href="Targeted Violence and Terrorism">Targeted Violence and Terrorism</a></a>
<a href="Prevention Grant Program">Prevention Grant Program</a>. These grant programs are focused on strengthening our national

preparedness by focusing on terrorism prevention activities and on providing support to local projects that seek to prevent targeted violence and terrorism. The site offers a wide array of resources including educational materials, trainings, and information on grant funding. - Mental Health Awareness Training Grants (<u>Deadline: May 1</u>) (as noted in last month's newsletter) the purpose of this program is to: (1) train individuals (e.g., school personnel and emergency services personnel including fire department and law enforcement personnel, veterans, armed services members and their families, etc.) to recognize the signs and symptoms of mental disorders and how to safely de-escalate crisis situations involving individuals with a mental illness and (2) provide education on resources available in the community for individuals with a mental illness and other relevant resources, including how to establish linkages with school and/or community-based mental health agencies.
- Enhancing School Capacity to Address Youth Violence (<u>Deadline: May 3</u>) this solicitation seeks to support targeted efforts to address youth violence through implementing evidence-based prevention and intervention efforts in a school-based setting (K–12th grade only). The goals of the program are to (1) reduce the incidence of school violence through improved school safety and climate and (2) prevent youth

violence, delinquency, and victimization in the targeted community.

- School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) The 2023 COPS Office School Violence Prevention Program is a competitive program that provides funding directly to States, units of local government, Indian tribes, and their public agencies to be used to improve security at schools and on school grounds in the jurisdiction of the grantee through evidence-based school safety programs. Up to \$73 million is available for this program.

#### **Community Policing Development (CPD) – Accreditation:**

CPD is a competitive grant program designed to advance the practice of community policing by providing guidance on promising practices through the development and testing of innovative strategies; building knowledge about effective practices and outcomes; and supporting new, creative approaches to preventing crime and promoting safe communities. The CPD – Accreditation program will encompass four separate solicitations for the following purposes:

- Support for law enforcement agencies seeking accreditation
- Support and enhancement of existing law enforcement accreditation bodies to facilitate the ability of agencies to become accredited
- Establishment of accreditation entities in states that do not have an accreditation body (opens March 17, 2023)
- Development of a national marketing program and provision of technical assistance to law enforcement agencies receiving COPS Office accreditation grant funding
- Approximately \$8.5 million is available for this program.

#### **COPS Hiring Program (CHP)**

The 2023 COPS Hiring Program is a competitive grant program designed to provide funds directly to law enforcement agencies to hire new or rehire existing career law enforcement officers to increase their community policing capacity and crime prevention efforts. All local, state, territorial, and tribal law enforcement agencies that have primary law enforcement authority are eligible to apply. Up to \$224.5 million is available for this program.

**Community Policing Development (CPD) – Implementing Crisis Intervention Teams (CIT)** CPD is a competitive grant program designed to advance the practice of community policing by

providing guidance on promising practices through the development and testing of innovative strategies; building knowledge about effective practices and outcomes; and supporting new, creative approaches to preventing crime and promoting safe communities. The CPD – Implementing Crisis Intervention Teams solicitation will provide grants directly to state, local, tribal, and territorial law enforcement agencies for the creation or expansion of crisis intervention teams and to embed mental and behavioral health services with law enforcement agencies so they can better respond to individuals in crisis in the community. Approximately \$11.5 million is available for this program.

#### **Community Policing Development (CPD) – Microgrants**

CPD is a competitive grant program designed to advance the practice of community policing by providing guidance on promising practices through the development and testing of innovative strategies; building knowledge about effective practices and outcomes; and supporting new, creative approaches to preventing crime and promoting safe communities. Under the CPD – Microgrants solicitation, local, state, tribal, and territorial law enforcement agencies may propose demonstration or pilot projects that offer creative ideas to advance crime fighting, community engagement, problem solving, or organizational changes to support community policing in one of the following areas: officer recruitment, retention, and workforce diversification; underserved populations; building trust and legitimacy with the community; hate crimes and domestic terrorism; and community violence intervention. Approximately \$5 million is available for this program.

#### School Safety Funding Available Through STOP School Violence Program

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) has several school safety and security funding opportunities currently available, with application periods open until various dates in May. Solicitations include the **STOP School Violence Program**, which provides funding to prevent and reduce violence in K-12 school settings through strategies that increase school safety; the **School Violence Prevention Program**, which provides awards to improve security at schools and on school grounds through evidence-based school safety programs and technology; and, the **Enhancing School Capacity to Address Youth Violence** program, which supports targeted efforts to address youth violence through evidence-based prevention and intervention efforts in a school-based setting.

#### Students, Teachers and Officers Preventing (STOP) School Violence (Deadline: May 8)

This program provides funding to support and assist county, local, territorial, and tribal jurisdictions in improving efforts to reduce violent crime in and around schools. It is designed to improve K-12 school security by providing students and teachers with the tools they need to recognize, respond to, and help prevent acts of violence and ensure a positive school climate.

   benefit LGBTQ students and heterosexual students, with heterosexual students seeing
   greater benefit in some risk categories. The reverse is also true. Restrictive LGBTQ policies

and practices negatively impact heterosexual students as well.


